# MESSAGE from the LIBRARY DIRECTOR

The Loveland Public Library is a crucial part of our community. In 2023, the library had more than 800 daily visitors. We offered essential services to the community. We hosted popular storytimes, including yoga and bilingual sessions. Over 17,300 people attended 390 storytimes. The Teen Hangout provided a safe space for teens to socialize, especially important post-COVID. The Hangout had over 56,000 visits. The Adult



Space was favored by those working from home, providing a welcoming environment for collaboration and Zoom conferences. The Library caters to all age groups.

Our strong community partnerships with over 40 organizations continued. We collaborated with the Larimer County Workforce to assist job seekers and the Loveland Boys and Girls Clubs for outreach programming. The Thompson School District partnership remained robust. We hosted KidsPak kits, the Larimer County Foodbank Lunch Lab, and the Mobile Laundry to support families and individuals in need.

Recognizing the need for digital literacy during COVID, the Library sought ways to support people lacking digital skills. The Library received two grants from the Public Library Association to offer computer classes. Our bilingual computer classes were very successful. The success of these classes was celebrated by the Public Library Association in October. Seeing the need to go beyond classes and provide one-on-one tutoring, the library secured a competitive grant in 2023 to hire digital navigators. We were one of two locations selected in Colorado. The grant allowed us to create a partnership with other Larimer County libraries. This partnership will allow us to provide robust service to the Loveland community for much needed digital training.

The Loveland Public Library continues to be an essential part of Loveland. We serve families, teens, adults, and seniors in a variety of ways. I invite you to step into the Library if you haven't visited lately and see what there is for you.

This year, we proudly celebrated our inaugural cohort of **Career Online High School graduates!** These exceptional individuals not only earned their high school diplomas but also recieved specialized career training in their chosen fields, equipping them with valuable skills for future success.

**Volunteers from Otterbox** played a memorable role in our summer learning program by introducing students to the innovative world of OnShape 3D design software. They demonstrated the power of this tool in shaping creativity and problem-solving skills. Also, Robotics 4 All, facilitated a dynamic four-class series on robotics. Students delved into the fundamentals of robotics, honing their technical acumen and fostering a passion for STEM fields. This collaborative effort not only enriched our summer curriculum but also empowered students with valuable skills for the future.



The library's technology department was selected by the state of Colorado to survey Larimer County's digital equity. We assessed the community's comfort with technology and their access to it. Our findings shed light on disparity in digital resources and proficiency, informing efforts to promote inclusive policies and to bridge the digital divide.

The Teen division added several new programs focused on teen engagement with peers, exploring creative and technological pursuits, & building support for mental health. Throughout the year 6,293 teens attended 188 programs.
